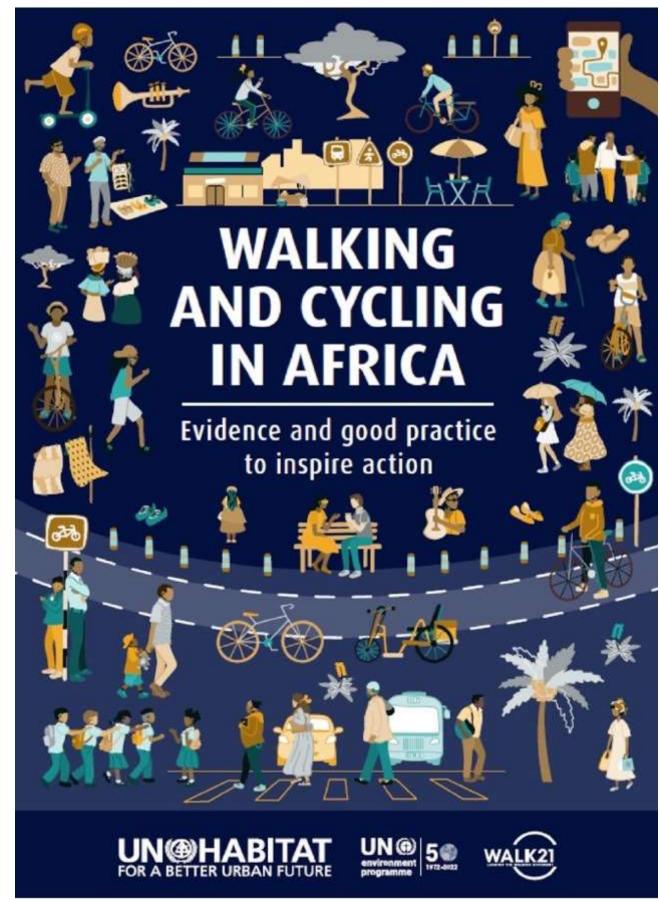

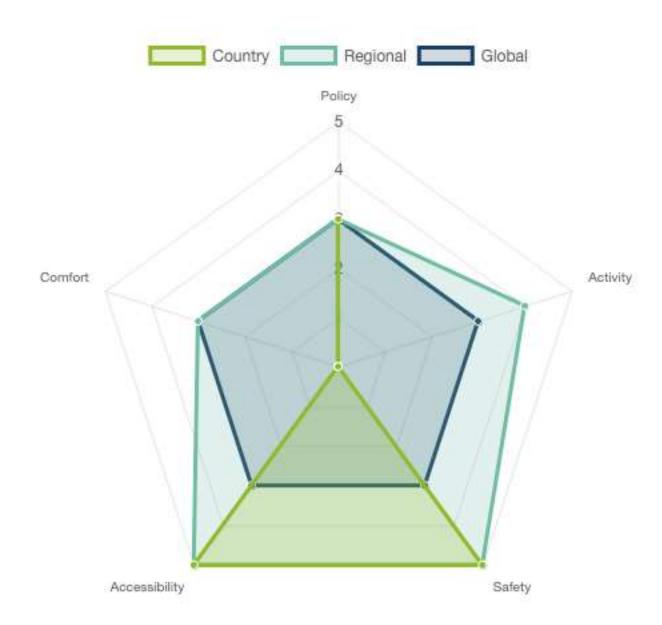

Profile of Germany (DE)

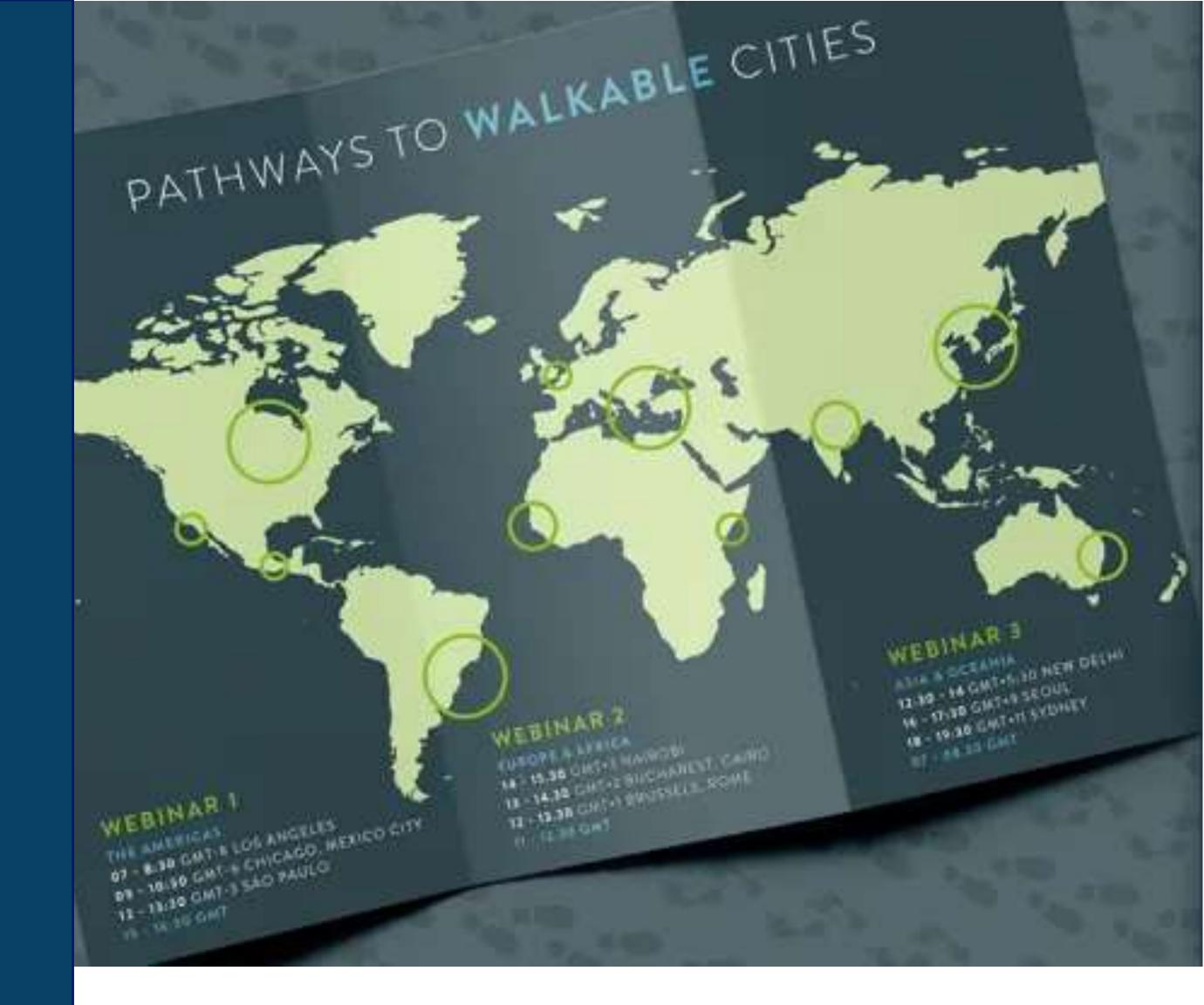
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Walking (or Cycling) Policy - **Yes**Safety (Pedestrian deaths per 100,000 population) - **1.3**Accessibility - **92.88%**

Public Transport

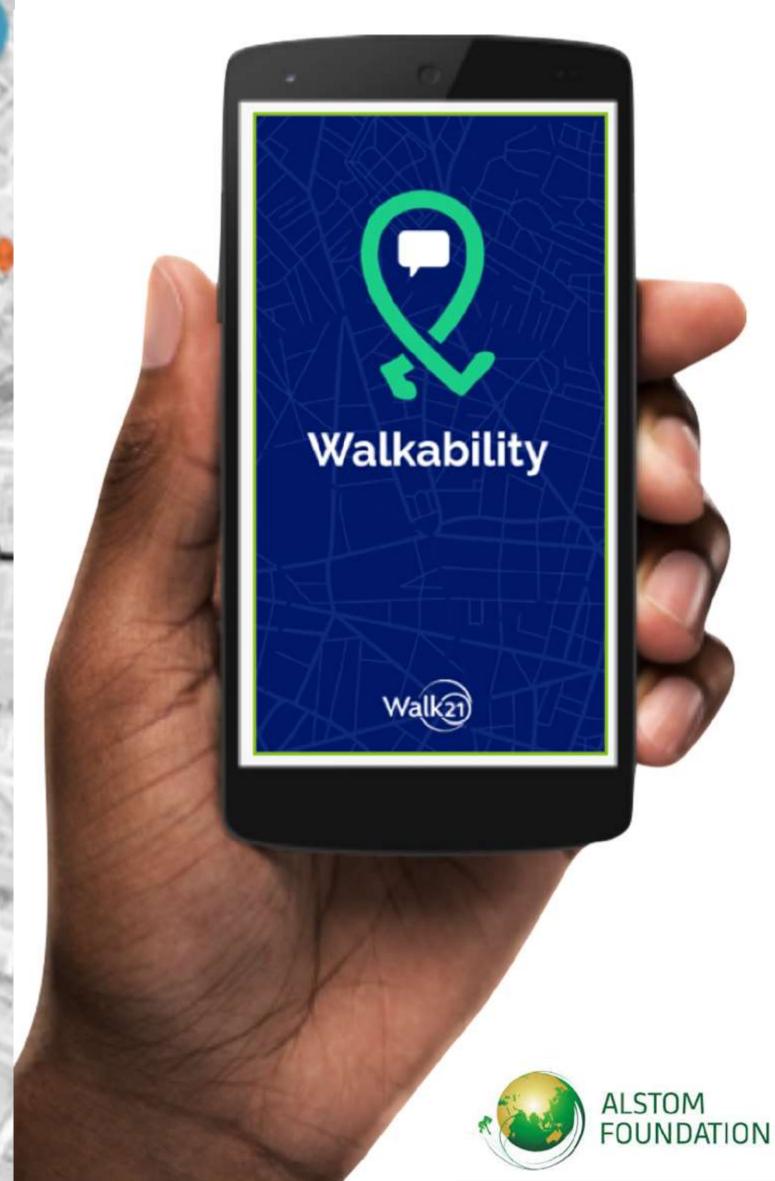
- A public transport system is door to door
